Elizabeth writes -

I had not realised that it was my turn to write an article for the magazine until a week before it was needed, so I have been exercised in my mind about what I should write.

It is October - the year already three quarters gone! – and in October the Church remembers a selection of “saints”, people who have been valued for their qualities of holiness, generosity, wisdom and example. These include St Francis of Assisi, William Tyndale, St Denys, St Paulinus, St Wilfrid, Elizabeth Fry, Edith Cavell, Teresa of Avila, St Ignatius, St Luke, King Alfred, SS Simon and Jude, Martin Luther – and others I have not mentioned.

Living in a world which seems to have to come to terms with, and cope with, so much fear and greed and anger and violence, it is some consolation to look at the list of people whose example has been catalogued through the centuries, who have been admired and venerated for their wisdom and insights, their generosity and love.

Here is an excerpt from St Francis’s Canticles to start the month:-

Praise to my Lord for Sister Water be;
Most useful, humble, precious, chaste is she.
Praise to my Lord for Brother Fire, so bright,
By whom thou dost illuminate the night;
For he is lively and most beautiful,
And most robust withal, and powerful.
Praised be my Lord and God for Mother Earth,
Who governs and sustains us; who gives birth
To all the many herbs and fruits that be,
And coloured flowers in rich variety.
Praised be my Lord for those who pardon wrong
For love of thee: enduring sorrow long,
Bearing their woes in peace – Blessed are they!
By the most high they shall be crowned one day.
Praised be my Lord for Sister Death, from whom
No living soul escapes. She brings the doom
Of endless woe to all who pass away

In guilt of mortal sin. But blessed they
Who die in doing thy most holy will.

News from Rukungiri!

In their August Newsletter, John and Alice tell us of a sewing machine that was donated as part of the aid brought to Rukungiri by Mission Direct. The machine is being used by Rovine, who has lived at Rukungiri since 1992 and who



has been supported through the Modern Primary school and then through The Gables Vocational Centre. Rovine has now finished her training as a tailor and the gift of the sewing machine means that she can be self-supporting. John and Alice go on to say:

" We have been able to put a deposit on the 200 acres of land and we have been given the Land Titles. So now we will be able to start planting beans and other crops to help to feed the children at the school. The other miracle is that the owner of the land adjacent to the Pre-Primary School, intended for the building of a girls' hostel for the school, has now agreed on a price and had handed to us the Land Titles before any money has been handed over. We praise the Lord and ask that your prayers will be that HE will finish the good work he has started. The Lord has also blessed the Rukungiri Orphan Partnership with many children being sponsored so far this year. But there are still many children waiting for sponsors, so please "Find a Sponsor for a Child". We thank you so much for all of your support and encouragement, we are continually reminded that *GOD IS GOOD, ALL THE TIME*, we praise his name."

Mike Pavasovic, a journalist by profession, has some wry thoughts on that age-old question "What's in a name?"

Thirty years ago I had cause to ring my friend Bill, a lad I knew from university. Everyone called him Bill, and that was who I asked for when his mother answered the phone. She responded with a curt, "Just a minute, please," and then I heard he shout, "William."

As you might expect, I felt a little embarrassed and that could often be the case when I rang clergy while working as a district reporter. You could never be entirely sure if you would use the right term.

Standard newspaper practice was simple: Catholic priests are called "Father", and all other clergy are referred to as the Rev. Bloggs, vicar of St Cuthbert's, and then as Mr. Please note, this was 1984!

Well, the trouble started with the first Anglican clergyman I dealt with. He was new to town and said he wanted to be called "Father". My editor simply couldn't grasp this but eventually gave in.

To be fair, this priest was only stating a preference. However, a couple of years later I came across a man who would literally fly into a rage if called anything other than "Father". I can remember being at his house one night when someone rang and asked for the pastor.

For all I know, the caller might have been recently bereaved but father Rip-rap went purple. "Pastor! What do you mean?" he hooted. "This is the Church of England. We don't have pastors here."

Eventually, the caller must have used the magic word and Father Rip-rap calmed down. He was essentially a good man but couldn't control his temper. He lost it again when a parishioner called the local Unitarian chapel a church. "It is not a church," he thundered. "It is a schismatic conventicler."

All right, Rip-rap is an extreme example, but you could have your problems with friendly clergy. I rang one once and asked to speak to Mr Bloggs. "Who?" came the reply from his daughter. "Mr Bloggs," I replied. "Aaah," said the daughter with a definite edge to her voice, "you mean Reverend Bloggs."

Feeling suitably admonished, I might have replied that calling someone Reverend Bloggs, without the "the", is to use an adjective as a noun. But I decided discretion was the better part of valour.

Schools News – Supporting our Governors

As a parish, we have a good number of people serving as governors in our local schools. This may be as Foundation Governors representing the parish or the Diocese in our church schools, as parent governors or as governors representing the local community in both church and community schools.

School governors have a very important part to play in developing the overall policies within which schools operate and also in providing links between the school and the local community. This is an important Christian service and as such should be valued by the church.

Being a school governor is one of the ways in which Christians can express their vocation to follow Christ by serving their local community. Christian governors may have a very important role to play in encouraging the links between the school and the local churches. This will not be their only task. They may be able to make an important contribution to the development of policy in religious education, school worship, sex education, and the spiritual, moral, social and cultural development of the pupils as well as areas of the general school curriculum where they have insights or expertise. They may also be able to support those parts of the school's management that are concerned with staff recruitment, selection, development and reward. They will bring important insights to bear on matters of pupil or even staff discipline. Governors are asked to contribute a considerable amount of their spare time to the role.

Please do pray for all those in our parish who act as Governors as they undertake this important role.

Be with our Governors, Lord as they learn from you how to best serve the youngsters and the staff in their school. Help them to work together well, to listen and respect each other's talents and skills. May they be watchful and mindful of the responsibilities they hold as a Governing body and yet joyful in the privilege of seeing all grow. Keep them focused and distinctive in their Christian ethos and outlook. We thank you for their fellowship with all your people and especially those within the school community. We ask this in Jesus Name, Amen.

As part of her training, Pat did quite a lengthy placement with New Charter and spent time at Gibson Terrace. As we are supporting the children at Gibson Terrace through our Harvest Appeal this year, Roger asked Pat if she would tell us a bit about it.

Gibson Terrace, in Ashton-under-Lyne, is the largest of three centres for the homeless in Tameside. Following a major refit after New Charter bought it from Tameside Council in March 2000, it now contains 19 one, two, three and four bedroom flats and bed sits, together with one flat that is retained for emergency use only. Gibson Terrace is staffed 24 hours a day, 7 days a week.

Many of the residents at Gibson Terrace are children and there are strong links with St Peter's School, as many families have children who need to attend school whilst their long term housing needs are assessed. Some children are with one parent who has left an abusive situation. Others are with one or both parents who have been made homeless for other reasons. There is a limit to what people can actually manage to bring with them when they're made homeless and, often, it's the children's toys that are left behind.

A room is provided in Gibson terrace in which two child support workers, employed by New Charter through Government grants, can work with children between the ages of 4 and 13 after school and at weekends. This gives some respite time for both parents and children. In term time children can use the room for a quiet place to do their homework or just play with the toys. During holiday times, special events and outings are planned to give the children a sense of normality. New Charter raises funds amongst its staff during the year to provide Easter eggs and Christmas presents for the children.

The staff at Gibson Terrace try to stand alongside the people who have been placed there. They are absolutely committed to supporting people who find themselves in the distressing and traumatic situation of being homeless and helping them to cope with all the emotional stress that is part and parcel of such a difficult situation. Many of the residents have not only lost their homes but their self respect and their self confidence, too. They are not coping with day to day life in the way that they perceive the majority of society is and they are at absolute rock bottom. Hopefully, with the support of their key worker and the visiting agencies, they can begin the long haul back to getting another home and a way of life that so many of us just take for granted.

Comments from our visitors included "an inspirational, beautiful and breath-taking church", "a wonderful experience", "awesome windows", "very interesting tour" and "excellent views from the tower - well worth the climb."

An interesting piece from the latest Mission Update from CMS (Church Mission Society) tells of Baptism by bucket! The event took place in July, when, under the eyes of a prison officer and a district deputy, 11 new Christians from a prison in western Nepal were baptised out in the prison yard. Apparently there is nothing like a pond or a tank that could have been used for immersion within the prison walls and so the only way to get round the problem was to prepare a bucket of water for each of the men to be baptised. The article says, "the men stood quietly, receiving prayer and then a bucket of water was poured over each one. One by one, as they were baptised they praised the Lord and expressed a great feeling of freedom in their hearts even though they have been behind bars for several years. Then they all took part in the Lord's Supper."

We have no idea how hard it is for some Christians to follow their faith, do we?

Flu Pandemic



The latest instructions from the Diocese concerning the Flu Pandemic are as follows:

For the past three weeks the rate of new cases of swine flu has fallen in the Northwest. This means it is likely that the first phase of the Pandemic has peaked.

The Diocesan Pandemic Advisory Group has decided to advise that the Diocese to move to amber alert. This change in status means that, for the time being, the common cup can now be reintroduced and the peace can return during communion. However, clergy should continue to advise 'at risk groups' not to receive from the common cup and are free to return to red alert should their local circumstances demand it.

Did you know

- that Manchester Diocese oversees education for over 50,000 children in 9 secondary schools, 2 co-sponsored academies and 192 primary schools
- that, in 2008, the Church and Society Department of Manchester Diocese supported parishes to secure nearly £1.5m in grants and loans and an additional £1.4m in grant offers from English Heritage
- that, in 2008, the Property section of the Diocese took responsibility for 317 clergy houses, rented 16 houses for curates and carried out 57 quinquennial inspections?

A lot more goes on in Church House than you might think!

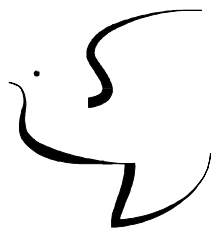
